AD fired after theft conviction

BCC's Deacon facing prison

Paul Deacon has been dismissed as athletic director and boys basketball coach at Burlington Catholic Central High School following his conviction Friday on a felony theft charge in Brown County Circuit Court.

Paul Deacon faces up to 3½ years in prison after being convicted by a jury of nine men and three women of stealing \$10,928 from the athletic department at Bay Port High School.

He worked at the school, on the northwest edge of Green Bay, from 1996-2004, rising to the positions of athletic director and head boys basketball coach.

After a three-day trial, the jury deliberated for less than three hours before delivering its verdict. Deacon's sentencing hearing is set for Feb. 24.

Despite the decision to dismiss Deacon, made by school administrator and principal Greg Groth, the school's support for the Deacon family was clearly communicated in its announcement Saturday that Tyrone Deacon - Paul's son, who is in his first year out of college - will take over as co-head coach of the Hilltoppers varsity team.

According to a statement made Saturday evening by girls basketball coach Todd Willems, who said he was serving as a spokesman for school administration:

"Burlington Catholic Central boys basketball coach Paul Deacon has been released from all of his duties, effective immediately. Freshman coach Tyrone Deacon has been elevated to boys varsity coach, along with current varsity assistant Chad Novasic."

Willems said no other school officials would comment until Monday.

Catholic Central started the season 2-1 and is 0-1 in the Midwest Classic Conference Central Division. Tyrone Deacon and Novasic led the Hilltoppers into action against Racine Lutheran late Saturday.

Tyrone Deacon played under his father at Bay Port, earning a scholarship from Michigan State University. He transferred to UW-Parkside and averaged 14.5 points, 14.9, 11.4 and 9.7 as a four-year

starter from 2004-'08.

Paul Deacon joined Bay Port's staff in August 1996 and became athletic director and head boys basketball coach, building a record of 121-56. He resigned in February 2004 after a suspension over a conflict with student-athletes.

Deacon then was hired at Burlington Catholic Central and built a record of 81-22, including a 68-58 victory over Abbotsford in the WIAA Division 4 state championship game. As athletic director, he managed a program that won state championships in football and girls volleyball last month. It was the school's third consecutive Division 4 title. Deacon's daughter, Alexa, is a senior starter on the Hilltoppers' girls basketball team.

According to court documents, prosecutors alleged that between 1996 and 2004, Deacon deposited \$10,928 in checks from vendors and others into the Bay Port Basketball Club account rather than the school district's official account. He wrote checks to himself from the basketball club's account and used the money for personal expenses, prosecutors said.

According to a Green Bay Press-Gazette report, Deacon testified Friday that he spent the money on the basketball program and other equipment for the athletic department. He presented invoices and canceled checks covering \$6,055 in purchases for the basketball program, and said many of the items were still in use. Deacon admitted in court that his accounting measures were inadequate, the newspaper reported.

"I was trying to take the pressure off the regular budget," Deacon testified Friday, according to the Press-Gazette report.

Hempfield AD often 'borrowed' cash: filing

The Hempfield Area School District athletic director "had a habit of 'borrowing' funds" from the department, according to a filing in U.S. District Court in Pittsburgh.

That's why athletic director Greg Meisner's former assistant called the state police after \$4,200 disappeared from a locked cabinet in that department, the filing states.

Former assistant athletic director Mike Burrell Jr. was fired after the money vanished and then later reappeared, ending a criminal investigation. Among Burrell's duties were the collection and safekeeping of money generated at athletic events.

Burrell is suing the school board, Superintendent Terry Foriska and Meisner under the Pennsylvania Whistleblower Law, claiming the dismissal was in retaliation for exposing the alleged theft.

Burrell's attorney, Joseph Hudock Jr., said Meisner had only "borrowed \$40 or \$60" from the office. When the \$4,200 disappeared, Meisner denied any involvement.

He earns more than \$101,000 in the dual jobs of football coach and athletic director.

Meisner said Friday he could not comment because of the pending lawsuit and the fact that it's a personnel matter. The school board has argued that Burrell wasn't fired but was not rehired.

High school Principal Kathy Charlton ordered Burrell to contact the state police after learning the money was missing. During a joint search of the office by Meisner and Burrell, Meisner found a manila envelope containing \$2,380 in cash in \$20 bills, according to court documents.

Burrell charged that Meisner berated him for going to state police and for "suggesting that the money had been placed back in the office by someone after it turned up missing," documents stated.

Burrell also alleged that Meisner told him "he and (Burrell) should have kept the money and split it."

Meisner accused Burrell of disloyalty because Burrell would not tell him what he

told state police when they questioned him. State police instructed Burrell not to discuss the investigation with Meisner, according to court documents.

Meisner also told Burrell that he disapproved of Burrell's friendship with Hempfield's basketball coach, Bill Swan, according to the document. Swan was suspended for two games earlier this year for using profanity toward a fan. Meisner gave the school board a 13-page evaluation of Swan's behavior.

Meisner asked a judge to dismiss Burrell's lawsuit. He argued that public employees are not always immune from discipline by their employers for speaking out about possible wrongdoing or corruption.

Meisner's attorney, Susan T. Roberts, said because Burrell was speaking in "his official job duties and that he was not speaking as an ordinary citizen," according to the motion to dismiss, his First Amendment rights were not violated.

Hudock said exposing potential wrongdoing was not part of his client's official job duties and "it cannot be said that he was speaking as anything other than a citizen ..."

"Granting the defendant's motion to dismiss would serve not only to deprive him of his day in court, but would also deny (Burrell) of his First Amendment rights and would eviscerate the purpose and spirit of the Pennsylvania Whistleblower Law," Hudock wrote.

He said Burrell's contention that he was fired "because of his actions following the missing money. It is reasonable to believe that a jury might determine this to be true."

Softball coach resigns over missing money

Rick Gamez resigns after auditors find more than \$5,700 being misappropriated on travel expenses

Oregon softball head coach Rick Gamez resigned Monday after an audit uncovered discrepancies of more than \$5,700 in his team's travel budget, Athletic Director Bill Moos said.

Moos said the discrepancies, discovered two years ago and investigated this summer, arose when team members were forced to sign for money they never received on road trips.

Gamez settled with the University for \$26,000, or half his yearly salary, and will reimburse the University for the missing money as part of the settlement. Gamez chose to resign and settle after he was presented with the findings of the audit, Moos said.

"(Gamez) is responsible for his program just like all my coaches," Moos said in a press conference Monday. "We believe it was his responsibility."

The investigation, conducted by the secretary of state's office, delved into the last two seasons but no further.

"We got word of it, and we went through the proper procedures," Moos said. "An investigation resulted, and we thought the appropriate action was taken."

Moos said complaints from team members and parents over the last two seasons led to the discovery of the missing funds in the spring of 2000. Moos said he was "comfortable" with the situation after a conversation with Gamez following the 2001 season, but complaints eventually reached the Oregon University System. The OUS then contacted the secretary of state's office to conduct the investigation.

The secretary of state's office has yet to release a report, but will do so later this week, Moos said.

Gamez has been Oregon's head softball coach for five years. He compiled a 168-164-1 record, and guided the Ducks to three postseason appearances in that time. Before Oregon, Gamez coached at New Mexico State, Central Arizona Community College and Glendale College.

"The improvement in our softball program has been very, very good," Moos said.

Despite the program's turnaround under Gamez, controversy surrounded the team last season. Senior starting catcher Kelly Planche unceremoniously quit halfway through the season, and the team often refused to practice as bad team chemistry led the Ducks to their first ever 40-loss season. After three straight postseason appearances, Oregon became the only Pacific-10 Conference team to miss the NCAA Tournament last year.

After last year's debacle, junior Lisa Wangler spoke of the team's disunity.

"I don't think it's going to be that easy to put this behind us," Wangler said. "All we can do is keep improving and keep learning."

Then-senior Triawn Custer added a prophetic statement after the 2001 season concluded.

"There's a lot of talent left on this team," Custer said. "Whether coach Gamez is here or whether these girls are here, this team still has a lot of potential."

Moos said he is unsure whether the Athletic Department will hire a new softball coach for the 2002 season. First-year assistant coaches Jennifer Jaime and Brent Rincon will take over as interim coaches until a permanent hiring decision is made.

The softball team has a preseason tournament this weekend, and will continue practicing regularly until the season officially starts next winter.

Former UT athletic director under investigation after audit

A former associate athletic director at the University of Texas Friday was under investigation after \$50,000 to \$60,000 were discovered missing.

Neither University of Texas police nor athletic officials would comment on camera Friday. They would only say Doug Wilson was no longer on staff.

Police are investigating what happened to money he was responsible for.

According to a search warrant, police believe Wilson "has possession of and is concealing... checks, cashier's checks, money orders, receipts, US currency and other records related to the Texas Relays."

Texas Relays is an annual track and field event held at the University of Texas that draws thousands from across the state. It's an event that Wilson had directed since 1992.

But since 2001, tens of thousands of dollars associated with Texas Relays has gone unaccounted for.

While executing the search warrant, UT police recovered dozens of old checks -- "entry fees" for Texas Relays paid by school districts across the state. The checks were found in Wilson's office at Darrell K. Royal Memorial Stadium -- they hadn't been cashed.

"A recent audit revealed that from 2001 to present, approximately \$50,000 to \$60,000 has not been deposited into the appropriate UT account," according to the affidavit. Police said the majority of the

money missing is cash.

"My initial reaction would be shock and kind of disappointment in the whole institution," said UT student Alison Smiley.

Police are still investigating why the checks recovered were never deposited. They said a lot of the money is still unaccounted for.

Wilson has not been charged with a crime.

Police said this investigation will be a lengthy process with all of the internal audits.

UT officials would not KVUE News if Wilson was fired or if he chose to resign or retire.

A QUICK GUIDE TO THE TREASURER'S OFFICE

The Carmel High School Treasurer's Office works very closely with the Athletics Office to insure the proper handling of money and accounts. Each sport has its own sub-account within the athletic department accounts. There are some important items to remember regarding the treasurer's office.

CAMPS

- All monies collected for instructional and summer camps should be run through the treasurer's office and checks should be made payable to CARMEL HIGH SCHOOL.
- Monies collected for instructional and summer camps should be given directly to the treasurer.
- A spreadsheet of the participants in your camp (complete with names, shirt sizes, money collected, and other pertinent information) should be kept by a member of your staff. This information should then be given to the treasurer periodically as you collect money for your camp.
- Reimbursements for camp t-shirts and other related camp items should be directed to the treasurer.
- Coaches and student-athletes who teach at your camp may be paid through your camp funds. Their payment should be commensurate with the amount of work completed by the individual. Addendum contracts for teachers or coaches within our school system may be required by the school district. Please check with the treasurer to insure proper payment. Taxes will be taken out of each paycheck for your workers. Please keep this in mind as you establish your payroll.
- Clinic expenses and the substitute teacher reimbursement needed to attend the clinic/meeting will be subtracted from your camp funds for the summer following the affected school year.

REIMBURSEMENT

- Requests for reimbursement should be given to the athletics secretary for approval by the athletic director. Receipts should include an itemized list instead of a general receipt with just a total amount.
- Tax cannot be reimbursed by Carmel High School. If you need a tax-exempt form for a purchase, please see the athletics secretary.
- All requests for reimbursement must be legitimate. Any attempts to forge or alter a document for the purposes of reimbursement may result in your termination from Carmel Clay Schools.

HOW DOES THE PRACTICE PACKAGE ACCOUNT WORK?

- The start of each new athletic season for your program will mean the purchasing of new practice uniforms and other sportswear. The practice package account for your program should NEVER run as a deficit account.
- Prices for your student athletes should be determined after meeting with the representative from the company you have chosen for your sportswear. Set up charges and delivery fees should be included in the price for your student-athletes. The member of your coaching staff in charge of practice packages is responsible for the collection of all monies. Monies should be collected in a timely fashion from your student-athletes. As a rule, do not let them order if they do not PRE-PAY. As a result, the invoice should be paid in full by the treasurer's office upon its arrival. All practice package monies should be submitted to the athletics secretary.
- The athletic department may provide support for any coaching gear IF you do not run a camp. Camp money should be set aside to budget for these items if you run an instructional or summer camp.

WHO DO I SEE ABOUT REQUESTING NEW EQUIPMENT FOR OUR PROGRAM?

- Requests for new equipment should be made to the athletics director only.

WHO DO I SEE ABOUT PURCHASING NEW UNIFORMS FOR OUR PROGRAM?

- Uniforms for our athletic programs are kept on a rotating process. Requests for new uniforms should be made at the post-season evaluation session with the athletics director.
